一、課程說明	<p>This course offers an introduction to methods that linguists use for describing languages. It covers major areas of linguistic analysis: phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, historical linguistics, etc.</p> <p>The overall goals are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) to develop the skills necessary to analyze the structure of language, and (b) to provide a general training in analytic thought. <p>By the end of the course, students are expected to be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) recognize the diversity of language systems and their fundamental similarities; (b) understand and use the basic terminology of linguistic subfields, including phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and historical linguistics; (c) use linguistic analysis to investigate the organizing principles of languages.
