一、課程說明	<p>This course assumes a basic knowledge of the Comparative Method of historical linguistics. It aims to provide an overview of the history of scholarship on Austronesian languages and to explore some of the most important and/or controversial issues in Austronesian historical phonology.</p> <p>Topics to be covered include (i) the history of scholarship on Austronesian languages (including Dempwolff's reconstruction of 'Uraustronesisch'; Dyen's revisions of Dempwolff's phonological reconstruction; the RGH Law; the RLD Law; the Pepet Law; etc.); (ii) the reconstruction and the status of laryngeals; (iii) Did PAn have a phonemic accent?; (iv) the reconstruction of PAn *C, *t; *d/*D/*z/*Z; *j, *g; nasals and laterals; (v) the reconstruction of "diphthongs".</p> <p>Students are expected to be able to figure out the historical development of PAn phonemes in an Austronesian language (a dialect or multiple dialects) of their choice at the end of the semester.</p> <p style="background-color: #e0e0e0; padding: 5px;">***This course will be offered in English.</p> <p>POLICY ON AUDITORS</p> <p>The auditing option is available only to those who do NOT have a student status in Taiwan. 六、成績考核	<p>The course grade is based entirely on how well the following requirements are fulfilled; NO second chance or alternative work can be given.</p> <p>(a) participation (10%)</p> <p>(b) one oral presentation [+ handout] (20%)</p> <p>(c) a term project (70%)</p> <p>[Students are expected to write a 10-20 page paper on the historical development of PAn phonemes in an Austronesian language (a dialect or multiple dialects) of their choice. The term paper should include at least a summary table of reflexes of PAn phonemes (see Blust 1999:43) and a discussion of reflexes of the RGH Law (both regular and irregular reflexes), reflexes of the RLD Law, reflexes of the Pepet Law, and reflexes of other vowels and consonants in a language of students' own choice.
