Course Name: Modernism Instructor: Yi-Chuang E. Lin Credit: 3

Course Description: In this course, we will cover a wide range of Modernist Literature in different genres along with the socio-political and economical context of the 'Modern World'. Through the works of James Joyce, Marcel Proust, E. M. Forster, Virginia Woolf, T. S. Eliot, William Faulkner, etc., we will explore how these writers, by experimenting with new possibilities of writing, try to accommodate a 'modern world' of speculative market economy, of quantum mechanics, of Big Bang Theory that has put values, traditional physics of Newton's law, orders, proprieties et al topsy-turvy. We will explore with these writers not only newly discovered geographical but also mental territories. We will look at how they aspire to capture "the realities" with new writing methods and style. And we will investigate their nostalgic and almost anti-progress search for a return to an old world of essence, of orders, of prestige. Throughout the course, we will ask what is '(High) Modernism'? How does it evolve? And what point does it attempt at with all its extravagances?
