

SURVEY OF GREEK LITERATURE

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course, students will be given a proper introduction to Greek literature. During the first few weeks, students will be familiarized with the mythological background of Greek literature. Then we will proceed with selective readings of the Homeric epics that foreground such fundamental Greek values as *xenia*, *polis* and *oikos*. The rest of the course will be devoted to reading and discussing works from three major Greek playwrights, Aeschylus, Sophocles and Euripides. These literary texts will not be discussed in and of themselves; they will be studied in relation to several important philosophical articulations concerning the nature of tragedy (e.g., Aristotle's *Poetics*). Students are encouraged to analyze these texts and express whether the emotional effects they experience from reading tragedies conform to or deviate from the standard set by Aristotle and others. In general, the course adopts a balanced approach in its engagement with Greek literature, with equal emphasis on textual analyses, historical contexts, and theoretical perspectives.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Introduce terms and topics in literary studies.
2. Establish the relationship between literary texts and their cultural and historical contexts.
3. Help students acquire the ability for literary analysis.
4. Cultivate student's capacity for critical thinking through discussion and writing.
