# The English Bible and Literature 聖經與文學

This course is intended primarily for readers with little prior knowledge of the Bible. It introduces students to some of the most famous narratives, characters, literary forms, and teachings of the Bible in the context of their significance for literature and culture. We will read selections from the Hebrew Bible (also called the Tanakh, known to Christians as the Old Testament) and the New Testament, focusing on the best-known narratives in Genesis and Exodus, the story of David, samples of the prophetic and poetic books like Isaiah, Job, Ecclesiastes, Psalms, The Song of Solomon, and the life and teachings of Jesus. Besides selections from the Bible, we will discuss the significance of the particular *language* of the Bible and explore a selection of modern interpretations and commentaries on the Bible in literature and cinema.

**N.B.** This course is a secular study of the Bible. It is a literature course, not a course on religious faith nor a self-improvement/spirituality course. If you are looking for Christian theology and/or spiritual improvement, this course is not for you. The course touches upon faith and religion only so far as they are cultural and historical phenomena that are relevant to human society, and when we discuss them they are not faith and theology as modern people or readers understand them today.
