This course introduces students to poetry in the English language. While it is not a comprehensive survey of all major poetry in English, we will read, enjoy, discuss, and investigate notable forms and genres of poetry in the language from the Middle Ages through the modern period. For the sake of convenience, the schedule of poetry for class discussion will be organized by authors and their works. In addition to individual poets' works, we will study technical basis of poetry and the development of different poetic forms in both British and American traditions.
