Course Description and objectives:

This course prepares you to teach English as a foreign language (EFL) and to meet the educational and linguistic needs of students at various levels of English language proficiency. Emphasis will be on second-language acquisition research, its educational implications, and instructional strategies that support English learners' development in listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

You will be able to:

- 1. Explain and critique methods and approaches of teaching EFL both past and present.
- 2. Plan and demonstrate an EFL lesson using appropriate techniques and methods.
- 3. Explore the sociocultural aspects of working with EFL learners within a variety of classroom settings.
- 4. Develop techniques for teaching the four language skills (listening, speaking, reading and writing) using a balanced literacy approach.
- 5. Apply knowledge of EFL methods by developing learning materials for current or future classroom use.

Regulations on Using AI

Students complete the in-class tasks and final projects on their own. AI such as Chat GPT can be used only for self- and peer-evaluations.

Course requirements:

The instructor expects all requirements to be fulfilled. No late assignments will be accepted for credit. This course is a three-credit hour course. The course will consist of the following: an interaction of lectures, hands-on activities, discussions, and presentations.
